Living Wage, Living Income and the **UN Sustainable Development Goals**





Living incomes and living wages are both about the income level that would enable a family to afford a decent standard of living.

A basic, decent standard of living!



What does it mean to be able to afford a decent standard of living?

The net annual income of a household, which comes from a variety of sources, is sufficient to cover the cost of a decent standard of living for a typical household in a particular place.

What does decency mean in this context?



Living wage is an individual concept.

A worker earns enough in a standard work week to enable his/her family to afford a decent standard of living.



LIVING WAGE COALITION

Living income is a household concept.

Farming households earn enough in a year from all income sources to afford a decent standard of living.



The Living Income Community of Practice

Living Income Concept

The concept goes a step beyond traditional notions of poverty alleviation that are concerned with basic subsistence and survival.

It puts a strong emphasis on the idea of **decency and earning enough income to live comfortably**.

Living Income is becoming a critical topic and discussions on this are fast gaining momentum and being prioritised.

2 Key Points

- Based on <u>households</u> (Larger families need more resources than smaller families).
- ✓ Is specific to a particular <u>place</u>

Actual Income



Net farm income composed of:

Revenues

Revenue from sale of produce – crops and/or livestock

Costs

- Input costs Planting and taking care of crops (e.g. seeds, tools, fertilizers and pesticides)
- Land costs rental/purchasing
- Labour costs paying wages of additional labour
- Unexpected costs e.g. to cover crop damage from drought or bad weather
- Other

All above costs could be accounted for through the reinvestment of revenues.

Applications of Measurement

Measurement of Living Income Benchmarks & Actual Income levels

Allow us to understand if a farmer is earning a living income.

From this we can then;

- Set clear targets
 - Define intervention strategies-looking at various levers of change
 - Develop an improvement program
 - Track & monitor progress
 - Further adapt interventions
 - Achieve desired impact

Strategies to Close Income



Variables that influence income?



*Other interventions at a public sector level, regulatory, consumer, supply chains also need to be considered

There needs to be a Smartmix of Solutions rather than isolated single pathway interventions. Some examples are as follows;

- ✓ Knowledge sharing & capacity building
 - ✓ sustainable agricultural practices
 - ✓ Cost efficient farm & resource management
 - ✓ Strengthening climate resilience of farms (through climate adaptation practices)
- ✓ Farmer organization

- ✓ Sector alignment
 - Organization & delivery of technical services
 - ✓ Organization & delivery of financial services
- ✓ Price and procurement practices
- ✓ Incentives

How do we know if our work is actually improving income?

We need to track, verify and monitor progress over time!

What do we need to demonstrate credible progress?

- ✓ Clear and well defined measurement indicators
- ✓ Data collection & analysis
- ✓ Verification & monitoring over time
- ✓ Robust assurance system
